- Feb 12-13, '21** *Salon de Idaho*. Solo exhibition at the house that once stood as 4112 Idaho Ave, Sylvan Park—a now empty lot that will soon be the site of a “tall and skinny” home, which has become emblematic of gentrification in Nashville. My friend, who was a renter of this house, was pushed out of his home with less than 60 days-notice during COVID-19. The owner was pressured by developers to sell due to personal financial and health concerns. We decided the best way to say farewell to the home before demolition was to host a salon of social justice art and live classical music. The exhibit was interactive, calling for viewers to respond to prompts in each room to questions like ‘What does your radically imagined new world look like?’ Themes of the works displayed included police and prison abolition, feminism, people power, and environmental justice.
